What is Pi Day?

Pi Day is a mathematical celebration annually observed on March 14, as the date corresponds with the first 3 digits of pi. This celebration was founded in 1988 by the famous physicist Larry Shaw. He made the connection between the date and the first three digits of Pi at an exploratorium retreat in Monterey. Since then, Pi Day has grown in popularity, and we now honour mathematics' real-life applications around the world on March 14.

Behind the scenes – preparing for Pi Day

The preparations for Pi Day began weeks in advance by a group of seven first-year IB students. They made a simple pitch to the teachers to transform a typical schoolday into a celebration within the mathematical realm. Once approved, the excitement grew stronger, and the workload doubled as the students worked tirelessly to

complete numerous tasks within a short period of time. They were challenged to come up with 15 innovative games that would take place in the different classrooms.

Teachers and student volunteers collaborated to craft an engaging and educational experience for all participants as room coordinators, whose task was to create the game and supervise it on the day of. The initiators cleverly came up with various contests, including "who

could make the best circular dish" and a dress-up contest called "If math was a person, what would it look like?" To elevate the experience, they also went on a quest for sponsorships in order to facilitate prizes.

They secured the following prizes: Movie tickets for the team that scored the most points, a Levi's backpack with stationery for the best dressed, and a Sugar Mill Cafe voucher for the best dish. The runners-up received a Zhaveri voucher. Last, they prepared schedules with the agenda for the day, ensuring that each hour was filled with mathematical madness. Once the entire school was divided into 15 teams and a leader was assigned to each, the preparation for Pi Day was finally

UNDER SXM - SCULPTURE SNORKELLING ADVENTURE

Everyone is aware that St. Maarten is a jewel with crystal clear waters, vibrant culture, and rich history. The new underwater museum, located in Little Bay, has magnificently incorporated all three aspects using more than 300 intricately made reef sculptures. The sculptures depict a fascinating blend of Taino heritage, Ponum symbolism, resilience, and the lively spirit of Carnival.

The first scene reveals more than 100 sculptures that are expertly arranged to weave a tapestry of the Taino heritage. It features the musicality through drums, the art, and the beauty of this tribe that once thrived in the region. A little further, an additional 41 sculptures reveal the captivating history of the Ponum dance. The details on the sculptures convey expressions of strength, resilience and hope, portraying

individuals holding their skirts and their scarfs a symbolic representation of the powerful dance that emerged during the emancipation of the island's people.

Continuing the journey, a huge metal art

piece represents the resilience of the island. The art piece is shown to have two hands holding each other, symbolizing the unification of diverse communities in the face of adversity. Both the Dutch name and the French name for the island are written below the hands. Above it is the saying, "SXM Strong", a popular hashtag that was used after the catastrophic hurricane, Irma, hit the island. This hashtag stands not only as an artistic expression, but also as a symbol of hope, resilience, and transformative power, mirroring the island's strength to reconstruct and evolve in difficult times. Surrounding the wall lie 30 sculptures of different nationalities living in unity and harmony.

The last set of statues unfolds the jovous celebration of carnival on the island. Huge speakers, people dancing with feathery wings on their backs, and local musical artists, such as King Beau Beau and King James, are all

underwater world is transformed into a dynamic dance floor as the ecstatic statues dance for their country. These four topics portrayed in the underwater exhibit deepen the narrative of St. Maarten, giving the tourist a glimpse of the history associated with the island. Additionally, it offers a visually compelling testament to the endurance and optimism rooted in the cultural heritage of our friendly island, St.

After this visit, we were taken on a very thrilling boat ride through the town area before heading back to the pier at Divi. Overall, it was a very exciting and interesting experience that I will always cherish, as I had the opportunity to connect with and learn more about St. Maarten's history through its natural beauty. I would have loved to learn more about the process of creating this underwater adventure and what each statue was made to represent, but hopefully that can be further

expanded on and explored with the help of a tour guide during the intriguing sculpture snorkel adventure.

Suhani's experience: Exploring the underwater museum in Sint Maarten for the first time was a captivating experience. From the moment I entered the water. I was astounded to discover an enchanted world of artistry and history. The sculptures were nothing short of breath-taking, displaying the creative talents of those who made them. The attention to detail, emotions, and effort put into each statue were

evident, even with medium visibility, creating a mesmerizing underwater

As I transitioned from one scene to another, a sense of pride surged through me, knowing that I was born and raised on this beautiful island. The museum provided a unique opportunity to visually witness the pre-Columbian history of St. Maarten through Taino sculptures, relive the struggles of slaves through the Ponum dance, reflect on

the unity of the island during Hurricane Irma. and feel the excitement of carnival dancers. Each sculpture told a story, developing a connection between me and the culture of my homeland. The experience extended beyond the museum.

We were brought to Divi Bay to view a sunken helicopter, which unveiled yet another aspect of the island's beauty. The marine life surrounding the wreckage was unlike anything I had seen before. Schools of colourful fish, swimming so close to the surface, followed me wherever I went in search of food. My fear of these gorgeous creatures led to


of wisdom from my snorkel buddy. I managed to calm down and take in the serene surroundings. Once I had said bye to my new fish friends, we set out on a tour of town, where we were able to see the vibrant colours of beach umbrellas and the magnificent buildings, and shortly thereafter headed back to Divi.

From that, it was revealed to us that the sculptures are made from an inert, pH neutral artificial reef compound, which fosters a suitable environment for marine life. This showcases the team's commitment to environmental sustainability and conservation.

Additionally, the sculptures were inspired by members of the local community, which enhances the cultural and historic value of the museum. It became clear that the UnderSXM team is not only a tourist attraction. but also a living testament to the unity, creativity, and resilience of the island's people. Before we parted ways, the enthusiastic response to the idea of future collaborations with local schools to provide insight and historical knowledge left us with a sense of excitement for the ongoing celebration of Sint Maarten's unique

Women's History Month is an annual commemoration that occurs in March in many nations globally. This event emphasizes and honours the significant achievements made by women worldwide in the fields of history, culture and soci-

Women's History Month originated in Santa Rosa, California, in 1978. The Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women organized and carried out a commemoration on March 8. The trend disseminated nationwide, prompting neighbouring villages to commence their festivities. In 1980, a coalition of women's organizations and historians, spearheaded by the National Women's History Project, advocated for acknowledging women's history at the national level. This resulted in President Jimmy Carter issuing the inaugural Presidential Proclamation on March 8, 1980. officially commemorating National Women's History Week. Annual proclamations establishing March as Women's History Month have been issued by each president since 1995.

Key highlights of Women's History Month:

- International Women's Day, observed on March 8, commemorates the accomplishments of women in the realms of society, economy, culture, and politics.
- Harriet Tubman Day, observed on March 10, pays tribute to Harriet Tubman, a prominent African American advocate for abolition and the pursuit of freedom.
- Equal Pay Day, which takes place on a variable day, represents the wage disparity between genders and emphasizes the necessity of equal compensation for compara-
- Ada Lovelace Day, which occurs on a variable day as well, commemorates women's accomplishments in STEM fields. Ada Lovelace is the world's first computer pro-
- César Chávez Day, observed on March 31, pays tribute to César

Chávez, a prominent labour leader and civil rights advocate, who played a pivotal role in establishing the United Farm Workers organiza-

The annual theme chosen and published by the National Women's History Alliance for 2024 is "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion". This theme acknowledges women's awareness of the imperative to eradicate bigotry and prejudice from personal and societal spheres.

Women's History Month is commemorated through diverse activities, encompassing educational forums, exhibitions, film screenings, community gatherings, social media initiatives, reading and literary groups, workplace festivities. and community service endeavours.







This shift in entertainment preferences has led to a noticeable trend for shorter songs. While this phe-

it has been rapidly accelerated as of late. According to research by Billboard, the average song length has decreased from around four minutes in the 1990s to around three, regardless of genre. This is not unexpected, given that many recent chart-toppers clock in at under three minutes, like "As It Was" (2:48), "Old Town Road" (1:53), and "Kill Bill" (2:33).

due to the song lengths contributing to the reduced album span. Take, instance, Ariana for Grande's latest album release, Eternal Sunshine. Although the album consists of 13 tracks (including an intro and an interlude), seven songs (excluding the above two mentioned) were under three minutes long, resulting in a relatively short runtime of just 35 minutes and 32 seconds.


As one of the most significant forces for discovering and amplifying music, both new and old, TikTok has had a

Just envision a classroom filled with anticipation, where learners enthusiastically gather around in a group/startup with objects such as wires, magnets, batteries, cameras and vibrant markers. What is their objective? It is to create a secure doorbell with sensors and cameras that can detect and allow for inhabitants to view who stands outside. As they create

this ideal prototype to pitch to five angel investors on a TV show called Shark Tank, one quesremains unanswered as they test with various desians as well as brainstorm ideas: How can STEAM education foster creativity and innovation in the classroom?

This group was known as RING and aired on Shark Tank in 2013, pitching their innovative product to the five sharks. Although investment was received, RING grew to become a multi-million dollar company, which was then acquired by Amazon for just over one billion US

STEAM education, a pedagogical approach, is one that combines the subjects of science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics into an organized structure for learning. In contrast to traditional educational models, STEAM emphasizes hands-on, inquiry-based learning across disciplinary boundaries. It allows and fosters critical thinking, problem-solving abilities, and a creative mindset, which are all very crucial for success within this ambitious and innovationdriven world of today. One technique that is heavily focused on as a method to foster creativity in STEAM is "Design thinking".

It is the methodology that is at the foundation of STEAM education: it enables students to think critically, come up with ideas and prototype solutions and test them. Design thinking stimulates risk-taking and innovation in students by immersing them in an organized process of creative problem-solving. To create a state-of-the-art doorbell prototype in the RING scenario, students applied design thinking principles that lay outside the circle of theoretical knowledge, which eventually stimulated creative thinking and encouraged group inquiry.

Another distinguishing feature in the renaissance of STEAM education is project-based learning (PBL), which is a newer technique that al-

SCIENCE lows and gives students an immersive practical experience that spans multiple fields of study. Here, students work together to design, for instance, sustainable ecosystems or program robots, as part of real-world

projects that encourage innovative thinking. One clear example of this was my personal experience with the TU Delft Team Challenge in the Matching and Selection Procedure to attain a spot in the most competitive course of Computer Science and Engineering.

During this process, applicants globally were grouped into teams of five members to solve complex puzzles unitedly. As we worked through the challenges of communication and deep thinking, we, the students, developed our STEM abilities which will aid in going on a project-based learning journey to design solutions to global issues. Furthermore

students are also now being encouraged to pursue artistic expression by means of digimedia, tal storytelling, and interactive design as part of STEAM educa tion, which commemorates the fusion of arts and technology.

Through the incorporation of arts into STEM courses, STEAM stimulates an innovative and creative culture that
