## MARKSETBOT ROBOTIC BUOY TO MAKE ITS DEBUT AT HEINEKEN

The Heineken Regatta this year will be introducing MarkSetBot, the world's first automated sailboat racing mark, a technical innovation that makes race management easier and more accurate for setting courses.

▼he inflatable MarkSetBot has been donated by Seiko for use at the Heineken Regatta. It will be used in conjunction with the other buoys that rely on anchor and chain to set in position, however, the MarkSetBot needs no anchor and can be moved around at the Race Officer's discretion if there are changes in wind direction, and reduces much of the work for

The versatility of the mark means it can be used as a pin end mark at start lines or finish lines or as a weather mark. The Mark-SetBot, which has a neat slogan "there's a botter way" has been in use at major regattas around the world for a few years already. Saint-Barthélemy has one which is used for the Bucket Regatta.

Race Director David Sprague is very familiar with the MarkSetBot, which is just one from a total of 28 marks used for the whole Heineken Regatta.

"The first prototypes came out in 2018. I've used them for the Lightning North Americans, at the US Pan Am Trials in 2023, and last year I used them for the J80 North Americans in Toronto, and at the Paralympic Worlds," says Sprague. "They are easy to manage and the support is very good. They've also been used for Sail GP.

"Its four feet high and six feet square sitting on two pontoons, round in appearance and made up of inflatable rubber rings. The pontoons and base inflate to 40 PSI, and the

rings to 10PSI, and one other part to 20PSI.

"It has a battery-operated electric motor with a GPS unit, an antenna that's connected to the cellular system, there's a programme that drives it and a propulsion system underneath," explains Sprague. "The signal from the antenna goes to the website server in Michigan and comes back and tells it to move left or right, within a couple of seconds delay. It holds just as well as an anchored boat will, or an anchored mark. The Race officer operates it using a smartphone or iPad."

The MarkSetBot will also be used for the Diam racing in Grand Case and placed close to shore as possible as a start pin, in addition to committee boat and two anchored marks. For the racing in Simpson Bay and Great Bay, it will be used as the pin end of the start line and moved to the finish line later.

"Another thought is that, depending on the wind, and we are running the A course, with a lot of windward leeward courses, we might use it as the weather mark because it can be moved easily. The intent is to get it into different spots so the sailors can see it, and for photos. For Grand Case, we will take it up there in the car, because speed wise, it only moves at 4-5 knots depending on the wind."

Chair of the Steering Committee Cary Lee Byerley added: "We are very happy that Seiko decided to join us and help us keep up with the latest technology."

Mark Townsend will be the Race Office for the Alpha course, Rob Rowlands is running the Bravo course, Irene Mc Neill will be responsible for the finishing, and Tom Clarke from Bermuda will probably handle the Diam Racing in Grand Case. All are certified International Race Officers.

Aside from racing on the standard re- bow are located, have lunch at any of the gatta courses during the four days of the Heineken Regatta, the Diam 24 class of one design trimarans will also race offshore in Grand Case on Saturday, March 8, for one day between 10:00am and 3:00pm.

This will be an exciting treat for residents and tourists. Organisers have arranged this as a way of bringing French Saint-Martin into the regatta. St. Martin Tourism Office and the Collectivité are sponsoring the event.

"The French side is very keen to be included in the regatta again, and we look forward to a good collaboration in the future," said Steering Committee Chair, Cary Lee Byerley.

"The stadium racing is a concept to bring sail racing as close to shore as possible for maximum visibility," explains Marketing Chair Meg Reilly. "Diams don't have keels as deep as keel boats so can come closer to shore safely.

#### **DIAM 24 CLASS TO PUT ON** SPECTACULAR SHOW IN GRAND CASE

Race officers and regatta pundits will be giving live commentary on the racing, the countdown to starts, the tactics and the play-by-play, as well as explanations for those not familiar with sailing and rules.

Currently 11 Diam 24s are expected to compete in the Heineken Regatta, the most ever for this rapidly growing fleet. Both sides of the island will be represented and teams will be competing from the British Virgin Islands, USA, and France.

The big news is that the top three World Diam Tour Champion teams will be participating, raising the competitive stakes higher than ever.

One of the super star teams is "Lodigroup" skippered by Loïc Escoffier, who will have on board Benoit Champanhac who won the Diam Class in the 2025 Caribbean Multihull Challenge (CMC). Escoffier won the last Route de Rhum in the racing catamaran category. "Team Oblige" is owned and skippered by Xavier Dubos, who was second in the last World Diam France.


"Dubos has been racing the Diam 24 in the last three or four seasons, and his team is very good, composed of younger crew who have done very well in Formula 18," commented Pierre Altier who will again be racing on "Cry Baby" with crew Noah and Sophie.

The third French team is skippered by Vincent Bouvier, the third ranked team in World Diam France

"I hope to do well this year, but our motto is: 'First have fun, come back in one piece, and also win if we can' – in that order!" said skipper Bernard Evan-Wong. "I have been a faithful supporter of the event since 1985 and have participated in every event, except about two since then, in different yachts."

Earlier this year, *Huey Too* and crew were in Grenada for their Sail Week – another regatta Evan-Wong tries to attend every year.

"I am racing my 48-year-old Modified Cal 40 *Huey Too*, which I have owned since 1982. We will race in the Valentine's Regatta, Nelson's Cup and RORC Caribbean 600 before heading to Sint Maarten to participate in the Heineken Regatta."

The crew are an eclectic mix of nationalities this year. Two Antiguan youngsters that run the foredeck, Ezekiel "Junior" Davis and Michael Moore.

"I am particularly proud of Junior, whom I trained from scratch. He only began sailing about 10 months ago and is now a competent bowman."

The team, including Junior, went to race at Cowes Week last year. What an experience. It was Junior's first time flying in an "aero plane" and his first time in a cold climate.

"Our team won our 38 boat division racing for the first time in the event, which has challenging conditions of weather and tidal currents," said Evan-Wong. "We will also have two young Dutch crew aboard, Hinke Kuipers and Valentijn Zoomers – both experienced sailors. I also have a young South African sailor, Anna Human; Tom an American sailor and a relatively new recruit to the sport; and my neighbour Mike Fung."

Evan-Wong grew up in a sailing family in the then Country of British Guyana racing as a crew from about five years old on Snipe dinghies with my dad on the brown waters of the Demerara River.

"Our family moved to the UK. In the 60s, I sailed in dinghies mostly then moved to Trinidad where I raced lasers, GP 14s and crewed on keel boats eventually owning and racing my own boats which included Mumm 36 High Tension, Melges 24 and Taz a full carbon RP 37 race boat.

"I have the honour of having raced in the RORC Caribbean 600. To date, 15, I believe."

It was in 1995 that Huey Too won the Most Worthy Performance at the Heineken Regatta.



# BUS AND HIS ISLAND WATER WORLD ARE READY FOR ANOTHER HEINEKEN REGATTA

Island Water World, a Melges 24, is just one of the more than 100 sailboats expected to be on the start line of the 45th St. Maarten Heineken Regatta, which sets sail March 6. Island Water World is skippered by Frits Bus, a doctor by trade, but also an avid St. Maarten sailor.

"Over the years, I've raced in 43 Sint Maarten regattas - long before it became the Heineken Regatta," said Bus. "My crew has changed over time, but it has always been made up of friends and family. We're not just a team - we're a group of friends who share a love for sailing, and that makes the experience even more enjoyable. Throughout the years, we've won at least one of every major Caribbean regatta, including events in Puerto Rico, Antigua, Tortola, and St. Thomas."



Competing in regattas around the Caribbean has allowed Bus and crew to build strong connections and friendships, while also bringing more sailors to Sint Maarten. "It's a great way to grow the sailing community and keep the spirit of competition alive," said Bus. "Currently, my daughter Berit is already for a few years part of the team and is a great help in preparing and organizing for the races."

Throughout the years, Bus and crew have won at least one of every major

Caribbean regatta, including events in Puerto Rico, Antigua, Tortola, and St. Thomas.

"When you win in other regattas, but regularly get beaten on your own island, it means the level of sailing on our island is high and motivates others to come to our island to compete," confesses Bus, who, along with his crew, is hopeful for another great Regatta and possible a win.

"We're in it to win it. The Melges 24 fleet is highly competitive, with crews at a similar level, making for intense and tight racing; but that's exactly what makes it exciting!"

LEGENDARY RECORD-BREAKING YACHT KIALOA III RACING IN THE HEINEKEN

The Sparkman Stephens-designed 79 ft maxi Kialoa III is entered in the 2025 Heineken Regatta in CSA 2 under Swedish owner/skipper Lennart "Lelle" Davidsson.

Regatta observers may remember this yacht raced in the Heineken Regatta a few years ago. She will be racing with a crew of 15, including a couple of locals from Random Wind Charters and big boat racing specialist, Gertjan Dommerholt. The remainder of the crew are of mixed nationalities. Davidsson will be at the helm.

Kialoa III's reputation precedes her. She is best known from her heyday during the former owner Jim Kilroy era for winning a slew of offshore races in the 1970s, including the 1975 Sydney-Hobart Race when she broke the race record with a time of 2 days, 4 hours and 37 minutes, a time that wasn't beaten for 21 years. Davidson believes that record has still not been broken

Davidsson is the new owner of Kialoa III since April 2024. He recalls Kialoa III last entered the Heineken Regatta in 2017, winning some silverware but doesn't remember which class. That year, and in 2018, she raced in the 50<sup>th</sup> Antigua Race Week and was the only classic yacht to win seven races.

"At that time, it was a semi-professional crew on board with skipper Roy Heiner," he remembers of the 2017 Heineken Regatta. "Since I purchased her we have done a lot of sailing, crossing the Atlantic a couple of times, going to Europe, to date about 13,500 miles in 10 months, and trying to build up a good crew."

There are periods in the yacht's history when it was not active, sitting in Curacao for two or three years and then in the US

at a boatyard for one and a half years. There are other versions of Kialoa from the Jim Kilroy period: Kialoa 1 from the 1960s, Kialoa 2 which is currently in the UK and planning to race the next Fastnet Race, and a Kialoa 4 and 5.

"Kialoa III was built by designers Sparkman and Stephens in 1974 for ocean racing at a very high level," says Davidsson "By that time a lot of knowledge was gained from Kialoa 1 and 2. When she won the line honours for the Sydney to Hobart Race it was quite remarkable because in the construction stage she was on the verge of being an old-type 70 ft maxi-rater. She is a bit heavy and I would say for

For Davidsson, this is the first year under his ownership.

"It's a little bit tough for us, but we are learning about the boat within our capabilities. We are not professional racers yet as a group. But we intend to have fun and do all the regattas. To be on a famous yacht like this, how cool is that!"

simple race course will be set up from the Sint Maarten Yacht Club, with a few marks to go round and back in the form of a time trial. Each student, there are six, will rotate on the boat with one of the coaches and their race will

be timed. At the end, medals will be awarded.

The students are D'Andre, Beyonce, Carlvin, Ezekel, Andrew, and Giovanni accompanied by instructors Chrisanki (a.k.a Chris), Elja, Maria and Joris.

Parents and staff members of the White and Yellow Cross Foundation and Sister Basilia Centre have been invited to watch the event.

The Sailability programme is two times a week – Tuesday and Friday from 9:30am to 11:30am. Selected by the White and Yellow Cross once a month on the last Friday, is a sensory group

that goes out on the water for an hour, mostly for the feeling of the wind, the water, and how the boat moves.

The regular group of students named above do a lot of the work on the boat. One is the helmsman, and the other handles the main sheet and the third person works the jib or is making knots and looking for the wind and points of sail.

"Maria is our helping hand during sailability. Whenever she can, she helps us out getting the boat ready, helping the students get in and out, and teaching them where the wind is coming from and what knots they can do. She is a great asset for us to have," says yacht club instructor Joris Zweers.

The idea is that the students afterwards will go out on a spectator boat to watch the Heineken Regatta racing, an excursion which they are known to enjoy.

"I'm very excited that we can include these students in the regatta," said Chair of the Steering Committee, Cary Lee Byerley.

## CARAÏBES DIESEL RETURNS TO MELGES CLASS AFTER **DISASTROUS 2024**

Erwan Le Norman from the Caraïbes Diesel Melges 24 is back in the class for the Heineken Regatta after a massive fire at his Caraïbes Diesel workshop forced him to pull out of the 2024 event.

Now he's greatly looking forward to racing the Melges again with his two sons, Emilien (16) and Clement (14). Emilien, who is already getting a reputation for being a talented, competitive sailor, will be helming the boat, and Clement will be on the mainsail and

"I got fired", said Erwan with a laugh, "because he's a better helmsman than me. But I'm still the skipper, adding weight on the rail and tactics. I'm happy for him."

Emilien normally races the Laser and the past two seasons have seen him win Most Worthy Performance at all the regattas, youth and adults, at the Sint Maarten Yacht Club.

"He beat Frits (Bus) and that's really an accomplishment. We are proud of him and this new generation of sailors coming up," Erwan added. "Even Clement is beating his brother now in Laser."

At the 2024 French National Championships in La Rochelle, Emilien finished 14th overall, a very significant achievement for a teenager without having a national coach.

Erwan bought his Melges in 1992. It was hull number 16, very new with a carbon mast and all the bells and whistles for

That was a revolution in 1992. Now it is 33 years old, but at the same time, it is still modern, still competitive and performs extremely well. I've raced in the Heineken Regatta around 15 times, the last eight years on the Melges 24."

Erwan is President of the yacht club in Friar's Bay "Saint-Martin Voile pour Tous" (SMVT), Saint-Martin Sailing for

Everyone. The club has been in existence now for five years and is growing all the time, catering to youth sailors and adult sailors. It has been many years since the French side has had a proper yacht club.

Emilien and Clement are heading to Martinique to compete in an international regatta, but will be back in time for the Heineken Regatta registration.

"2023 was not such a good result for us in the Heineken, but we hope to win the class one day," added Erwan. "However in the 2024 Course d'Alliance, we won the St. Maarten to Saint Barths race, beating FKG, Island Water World and Budget Marine, and finished second overall for Course d'Alliance."

Buoyed by his success at the 7th Caribbean Multihull Challenge (CMC) as part of the Diam 24 "Anomaly" team that won overall honours in the class, Jolyon Ferron is turning his attention to the Heineken Regatta where he will be the skipper on the Melges 24 Budget Marine.

ts familiar territory since Budget Marine topped the Melges class in 2024 and this will be the third Heineken season on this particular boat, which he part owns with Eddie Parish. He has raced on the Melges 24 since his teenage years and even earlier so knows the boat inside out.

Keen regatta observers will remember Budget Marine's Melges hull No. 5, sail number AHO 5, that used to be raced under the name of the clothing brand SLAM.

"I hope the wind calms down a bit," Jolyon says cheerfully from his office, referring to the unprecedented wind conditions at the CMC. "Most of the crew I sailed with last year will be with me again. It looks like we'll have a Melges 24-only class; whereas last year, we were competing against those older 24 ft boats from Martinique which are very competitive and well prepared.

"I'm sure the Martinique boats will be back and it will be great to see them, but I hope they will be in another class. For us, we will be focusing just boaton-boat and tactics," says Jolvon.

"It's going to be interesting, we've never raced against the Puerto Rican boat "Exodus" but Frits (Island Water World ) has beaten them in one regatta in the BVIs

in another regatta. I'm hoping the home turf and local knowledge will be to our advantage," he added.

"It's always very competitive between us three Andrea Frits. Scarabelli (FKG) and Budget Marine. Then there's

Caraïbes Diesel (Erwan Le Normand). You can never underestimate him, especially as he has his son driving. His son is a very good sailor so they are definitely a threatening team."

Jolyon prefers racing boatfor-boat where you know where you stand on the racecourse compared to the other boats, whereas, when racing against other types of boats, like those older Martinique boats, one has to beat them by a certain amount of time over the

With his father Robbie Ferron stepping back from day-to-day operations at Budget Marine, Jolyon is now taking more of a lead and more responsibility with the company. He dismisses talk that he is "taking over" the company.

as big as this, it can't be a one-man show. We do have a General Manager here. We have a lot of locations in the Caribbean, so I'll be taking more of a front row in making sure those companies are running well," he explains.

"A business of this size should not be run by one person making exclusive decisions. You can never be well informed enough to do that. My father is still involved as far as products are concerned. He is always interested in new products coming onto the market. In other words, he's still involved with aspects of the business that excite him."

With Budget Marine locations covering most of the Caribbean, Jolyon does not forsee any more growth in the company.

"There are some opportunities on other islands that we might look at, but we are not actively seeking more growth as there is enough to do here. The goal throughout all the Budget Marine locations is to have consistency; consistent look, consistent stock profile and so on, that you can expect from a reliable chandlery."

With more responsibilities in the company does it mean, as the rumour mill suggests, that he is stopping sailing altogether or just cutting back? It's a conundrum he's facing, given that he is equally passionate about sailing as his father is.

"Putting a team of five together for the Melges and preparing the boat is a lot of work. It's doable for the Heineken Regatta, but to do that consistently throughout the year, to keep the team well trained and prepared is a challenge and obviously my job and the customers are a priority. I see already for this year more responsibilities coming my way with Budget Marine.

"It's one of the reasons to step away from the Melges because it's a very preparation-intensive boat. If you don't have the boat prepared properly, if the rig isn't tuned properly, you will lose the race. But absolutely, if time permits with my job, I'll go sailing. The issue is I'm not one who likes to go sailing unprepared."

That said, he doesn't rule out going back to racing the Diam 24s next year or the year after, if time permits.

"It's a very exciting, growing class. Having a nineboat one design fleet here sounds small, but there is no fleet bigger than that right now on one island in the rest of the world. We are watching it grow with

The work of a sailmaker Regatta. can be demanding, even more so when the St. Maarten Heineken Regatta or the Caribbean Multihull Challenge (CMC) is in town.

The marine industry in St. Maarten is seasonal, meaning crazy busy in season, and quiet in the summer when the yachts leave before hurricane season. Then in November and December, the cycle begins again.

There are only two sail lofts on the island, both of them on the Dutch Sailmakers are side. an important part of St.Maarten's marine industry and have been

During regatta season, Tropical Sail Loft provides an overnight service for competing yachts that need urgent sail repairs before the next day's race.

"This is a critical service for racing yachts because they don't want to lose an entire regatta over a torn sail on the first day," explains Ernst Looser of Tropical Sail Loft. "For sailmakers, this can mean working through the night, sometimes for several nights in

"I remember many times finishing repairs just as the sailors were waking up for their next day of racing. A crucial to the success of few years ago, when the re-St. Maarten Heineken gatta had up to 200 boats, the overnight service could really tough. However, modern sails are of higher quality and more durable, which has reduced the amount of repair work required."

While sailmakers would love to participate in these regattas themselves, their priority is ensuring the success of

the event and the island's reputation.

"Professional sailors expect this service. If you rip your spinnaker, you start with adhedon't want to be out of the regatta on the second day. It's important for the island's image that sailors have a good experience. That said, it's usually the charter boats that keep us busiest overnight."

St. Maarten regularly gets visited by some of the world's biggest and most renowned yachts. Superyacht sails present an entirely different challenge due to their immense size and weight.

out of the tender, drive it to our crane, and lift it up to the loft's upstairs landing. Then we use a chain hoist to lift the sail the last few feet onto the sail loft floor. Sometimes, it takes five or six people just to open and inspect it.

"I recall one sail that needed repairs on both sides. After stitching one side, we had to turn it over, pull it out from under the sewing machine, roll it up, spin it around, and do the whole process in reverse. It took four people nearly an hour just to turn the sail around."

A sailmaker's primary tool is a heavy-duty industrial sewing machine, which today costs between US \$25,000 and \$30,000.

Most sail repairs sives to hold the material place before

"A sail like that can weigh 800 kilos," Ernst reveals. "We use a forklift to get it stitched for full strength.

"The damaged sail has to be stretched and pinned on the floor to ensure the repairs are completely smooth and free of creases. A sailmaker spends a lot of time kneeling on the sail, which is why you can recognise us by the callouses on our knees. Once everything is glued, the machine work is quick. The real skill lies in the preparation.

"In season, we usually have three people on canvas and one on sail repairs, and often when repairing the really big superyacht sails, the yacht crew help with handling too. However, during the summer, staff levels change as everyone takes some much-needed time off," says Ernst.

"We do all kinds of canvas work for yachts, including sail covers, awnings, and biminis. We also create awnings and mesh curtains for restaurants, hotels, and private residences. However, we don't do upholstery. There are excellent upholsterers here that we work with and can recommend. We service and repair all sails and, as the agent for North Sails, we also sell sails."

Tropical Sail Loft has a rich North Sails, through history. Originally, it was part of a ship chandlery in Philipsburg owned by the late Ronnie van Sittert, which included a small sail

loft in Pointe Blanche. The loft had been idle for some time when, in 1996, Ronnie offered Ernst and his wife Gill the opportunity to take

"We had just returned from cruising and didn't have much money, but we wanted to start a sail repair business," Ernst recalls. "Ronnie offered us the loft and helped us get set up. The business grew quickly, and by 1997, we split the sail loft into a separate entity, Tropical Sail Loft."

As demand increased, the Point Blanche location became too small, prompting a move to larger premises opposite Bobby's Marina. As the yachting industry shifted toward Simpson Bay Lagoon, the loft relocated in 1999 to the Budget Marine building.

After six years, both businesses needed more space, leading Tropical Sail Loft to move into its current 3,000 sq. ft. location in Lagoon Marina in 2006. This spacious facility allows them to accommodate even the largest sails.

Tropical Sail Loft, has been a proud sponsor of the Heineken Regatta for over 20 years, supplying the registration folders that sailors receive. These folders, with their

## STUDENT SAILING MATTERS -AS MDA REGROUPS FOR HEINEKEN REGATTA

After a wild and windy "The first time I tried it, I The watersports centre was 7th Caribbean Multihull Challenge (CMC) racing on the Diam 24s, Alain Pansiot-Villon and his intrepid Collège students are bracing for the 45th Heineken Regatta when the team again competes in the Diam 24 class.

f the wind is anything like the conditions for the CMC, expect more exhilarating, white knuckleracing, treading that fine line between keeping it all together and a full on pitchpole or capsize.

Thankfully, neither happened to them at the CMC. Alain marvels at not only the speed of the Diam trimarans, but how robust they are in blustery, wavy conditions. The team finished fourth overall over the four days out of the 12 races sailed among the fleet of nine Diams.

"It was magnificent. Sensational, flying the hulls, and at the same time dangerous," exclaims Alain, "On the last day, we had a tear in the gennaker and the wind was blowing over 25 knots but we still continued."

The students are not alone on the boat. There are three other instructors. Each day, students and teachers rotated on the Diam so the students had an equal experience. For the CMC, there were eight students rotating.

Two years ago, Pierre Altier introduced Alain to the Diam 24 trimarans when he their agent.

just went 'Wow'. I was so impressed with the handling and speed," Alain recalls.

It was not widely known that former Préfet Vincent Berton was a sailing enthusiast. Alain took him out for a sail on the Diam which he really enjoyed. Alain said jokingly, "Now you have to help us buy one." Berton actually agreed and obtained funds for the association through the "Appel à Proiets" scheme

Altier's aim was to build up a rental fleet to form a class when the popularity of the boats became apparent. If one couldn't afford to buy the boat, one could rent one for a specific regatta; the second year, you would rent it on a long lease for the whole year. It explains how the class has rapidly grown. Now top Diam sailors often come down to the island to train in the warm waters.

Alain Pansiot-Villon, born and raised in Guadeloupe, is now in his 25th year as an all-round sports teacher at Collège Mont des Accords since his arrival in 2000.

He was formerly focused on teaching kids basketball for several years, but in 2010 returned to his first passion, sailing. In Guadeloupe, he worked as a sailing instructor at sailing club Cercle de Sportif Bas du Fort (CSBF) in Gosier.

The Collège's watersports centre (Base Nautique) in Galisbay, located adjacent to the former Omni Sports

created in 2015 with the help of European funds. The location already had the advantage of a ramp for access to the sea, part of it is covered with artificial grass so as not to damage the boats. It also has enough space to park three Diam 24s which can be rolled into the water on a trollev.

"Since 2020, youth sailing has really grown. We have the Collège sports association AS MDA, the Friar's Bay Yacht Club, the youth sailing programme at Sint Maarten Yacht Club, and youth sailing in St. Barths," notes Alain. "There is usually a regatta every week between islands or schools."

The fleet of boats for competition comprises Lasers, Hobie Cats, Open Bic, RS Feva and Optimists. But also kayaks, windsurfers and paddle boards for recreation. Recently, four boats especially adapted for people with disabilities were purchased from Antigua.

Also obtained through the AS MDA are two seven-metre long two-masted schoo-"Goélette Mercator" ners based at Marina Fort Louis for teaching sailing. They can each take around 10 students.

Teaching students to sail until they can be comfortably competitive on the Diam or other boats, usually goes in a five-year cycle, Alain explains.

"The first thing they have to do is learn to swim. ing equipment because the

material is expensive and that requires patience. The students pay just 10 euros for a license for the whole vear to join the club and the MDA pays the Sailing Federation license for the club students."

Students go to Collège Mont des Accords from 10-11 years old and it takes a student, who is serious about

sailing, four to five years to become competitive. Then the cycle starts again with a new batch of students.

Today, Alain can say that he has several students who are truly competent and competitive. For example, he cites Merlin Guerrier (16), Pascal Belletier (18), and two girls - Océane Chilou (14) and Malia Mai-

sonneuve (14) - and Zarick Bertaux, who all raced in the 2024 Heineken Regatta and will also make up crew for the 2025 Heineken.



"We're very excited to be playing at the Heineken Regatta, especially in the Caribbean," bass player and leader of The Wailers, Aston Francis Barrett Jr. told *The Daily Herald*. "The Wailers bring peace, love and unity through our music. The audience can expect the hit songs and more."

As for how the band honours the legacy of Bob Marley while keeping things fresh, Aston said, "We stay true to Bob's message of positivity. We bring the spirit and message of my father, Aston 'Familyman' Barrett, the one who's responsible for keeping The Wailers' music legacy alive." The Barrett brothers, Aston Barrett and his brother Carlton Barrett, shaped this music. "This is our legacy," he added.

The Wailers are also ready to celebrate a major milestone – 40 years since the release of their Legend album. Asked whether there were any surprises in store for attendees, he responded, "Yes, we will be playing the Legend album to celebrate the 40th anniversary of its release. We may add a surprise song in the set outside of this album," he hinted.

So, we started the show dub-style until the other band members could join. The audience loved it — original Familyman style."

The Wailers' music continues to resonate with fans of all ages. The Daily Herald asked how the band balances staying true to the roots of reggae music while appealing to new, younger audiences. "The Wailers' music has no category. It's not old or new, it's just there. It's a spiritual music that evolves every time it's needed to keep a positive energy around the world," he explained.

As for new music, fans won't be disappointed. "Our Grammy-nominated album Evolution was released in August last year, produced by Emilio Estefan. We might do a song from it; you never know," he teased.



# SPECTATOR VIEWING HOT SPOTS

The preliminary course will have been released in advance, but each night prior to a race day, there is a meeting in which weather conditions are factored in. Consequently, the course pathways as well as the start-times and such may change. So, it's best to stay tuned-in to Island 92 and www.heinekenregatta.com

The "AROUND THE ISLAND" race tends to be on the Friday, which makes it a great day to go boat chasing! You also want to stay up-to-date with the new "Stadium" Spectating addition in Grand Case this year, which is projected to be Saturday. The smaller boat will be racing closer to the shoreline so setting up on the beach over there will be serious fun.

We compiled this list of suggested HOT Spots for spectators looking to catch the action:

- St. Maarten Yacht Club is an ideal place to kick things off. Not only do they serve great breakfast and Bloody Mary's, but it is the best location to watch the sailboats head out the starting line. There will always be a 3:00pm inbound bridge, which means "Happy Hour" time is also a great way to see the boats pass through the bridge area. Sometimes, there will be an additional 2:00pm bridge opening.
- There are several **Spectator boats** available including the Radio Press Boat, **Boomerang**. There is the **Spirit of** *St. Maarten*, and Billy Bones will send out speed boats sometimes. You do need your "sea legs" to be ready for a full day of boat chasing. Food and drinks are usually included on larger spectator boats and it is the best way to really get up and close to all the action!
- The various beach bars like Boon Beach Bar, D's Beach Bar, Sunset Beach Bar, and K-like Karakter on Simpson Bay Beach are great because the starting line is usually out there as well as the finish line. Buccaneer Beach Bar on Kim Sha Beach could also be an option.
- If you want to capture some passing action on Maho Beach with the airplanes flying over your head, then Tortuga, Driftwood, Sunset Beach Bar and Sand Bar are nice options.
- In Cupecoy, you can stand on the wall across from the former **Blue Mall** and you have a nice panoramic view point. If you prefer to go closer to the beach, the wide angle view shortens, but **Danny's Beach Bar** is a great spot to catch a refreshment.
- Rainbow Beach Club, Captain Frenchy offer prime locations for both relaxing and watching the races and they will be great on the "Stadium" Spectating race day. Or even the Lo's BBQ places as you can walk out to the pier area.
- A trade secret **Coralita Beach** has a look-out point... a wooden tower you can climb and see overlooking Orient Bay Beach to nearly Oyster Bay. It's always breezy here and there are lots of parasailing and other water sports zinging around.
- If you are in Great Bay Beach, then most of **the Boardwalk** places can be good, including **Dutch Blonde Beach Bar** with a second floor viewing angle is perfect or try the new **Marley's Bar**.
- Divi Resort and Belair Beach Resort both have dining and drink options.
- Simpson Bay Resort all the way down the point is a beach bar and this is certainly a hot spot because you are nearly in the water!

Really, the important thing to do is to get out of the office, take a break, or even get out of that hotel room. Head to the beach, pull up a beach chair, get a frozen drink in your hand and do some sailing spectating! Have a lovely, "seriously fun" time, everyone!
